

NDN Cooperative Desexing Program

- Ongoing all year round
- Low cost desexing
- Targeted to help residents in need
- Easy, cost-effective and justifiable for Councils
- Applicable for owned, semi-owned and unowned cats

Focus on cats

- More prolific breeding rate of cats than dogs
- A greater proportion of unwanted litters of kittens than puppies in pounds and shelters.
- Double or triple euthanasia rates of cats than dogs in most Australian states
- However the program can also include dogs









Who is eligible for the NDN Cooperative Desexing Program vouchers?

All residents in need i.e.

- Pension/ concession card holders
- People on low incomes
- People with large numbers of cats
- Residents willing to desex and adopt or rehome stray unowned cats









NDN Cooperative Desexing Program

The costs shared by:

- Owners
- Council
- Local Vet Clinics
- National Desexing Network











NDN covers the labour costs of setting up and managing the program i.e. runs the program free of charge for Councils

- Invite local vets
- Provide promotional materials
- Receive calls & issue vouchers
 5 days a week all year round
- Organise vet payments
- Keep data
- Report to Council
- Update the program structure when needed

Current NDN Cooperative Desexing Program Costs

These are reviewed and adjusted as needed every 2-3 years to maintain a reasonable payment to vets.

CATS	Owner pays	Council Subsidy	Vet receives*
Male cat castration	\$55	\$45	\$100
Female cat spey	\$65 for first cat \$50 additional cats	\$85 \$100	\$150







NDN Cooperative Desexing Program

- Participating veterinary clinics agree to receive the set reduced payment that still covers all wages (vet, vet nurse and receptionist) and material costs (sutures, painrelief, etc) for the procedure
- Vets benefit from fewer requests for euthanasia and discounted/free services
- Councils maximise the number of cats desexed with limited public funding







Ineffective desexing programs

- Some Councils have been offering a voucher only e.g. \$50 toward desexing
- As some vets charge \$250

 \$300 to desex a female
 cat, residents on low
 income still have to pay at least \$200, plus an extra
 \$70 \$100 if the cat is pregnant or in-season, which they cannot afford









An example of a Victorian Council's AVA Desexing Subsidy Program with discounted vet prices and a Council subsidy still costs too much for residents in need to afford for female cats

Age of cat	Discounted desexing fee	Owner pays	Council pays
Female mature (over 7 months)	\$168	\$112	\$56
Female immature (under 7 months)	\$144	\$96	\$56
Male	\$96	\$64	\$32








Some Council programs have prohibitive voucher conditions

- a maximum of two vouchers per household
- pets must be vaccinated and have a current vaccination certificate
- if your pet is an older female an extra charge applies.

NDN Cooperative Desexing Program has consistent conditions for participating vets

- 24 hour pain relief included
- no requirement to vaccinate before desexing.
- If cats are pregnant or in season, owners are not asked for additional payment. Instead vets claim an additional \$55 from the Council Desex Fund.









Low cost V Free Desexing?

- To maximise the number of cats desexed with limited public funding, the NDN Cooperative Desexing Program asks residents to pay a small proportion of the desexing cost (which is affordable from their pension or low income i.e. \$55 - \$65.)
- However if Council can afford to cover the whole vet payment and still desex large numbers of cats particularly in targeted low socio-economic areas, providing free desexing to people in need or all residents is worthwhile and possible in our program.







Free Desexing

- So far only one Council with a higher socio-economic demographic has provided free desexing to everyone, using the NDN Cooperative Desexing Program, to increase the uptake.
- While people who access the NDN program generally indicate they are happy to pay \$55 -\$65, there are some who are unable to pay this amount.







Where free desexing is necessary

- People who have taken in a stray cat or two who are pregnant so they end up with 10 kittens as well. They want to prevent further breeding but are unable to pay for 10 -12 cats to be desexed. If these kittens then breed or are given away undesexed, the problem just gets worse.
- It can be also justified for people who are willing to help organize desexing and rehoming to reduce colony cat numbers, as they are providing a community service and reducing Council workload.







New element for NDN Cooperative Desexing Program in 2021

CATS	Owner pays	Council Subsidy	Vet receives* Covers all costs incl wages

Female cat spey	\$65 for first cat \$50 second cat	\$85 \$100	\$150
More than 2 cats	Free	\$150	\$150







Some Councils include microchipping in the NDN Cooperative Desexing Program

CATS	Owner pays	Council Subsidy	Vet receives* Covers all costs incl wages
Microchip	\$5	\$25	\$30







Cat Microchipping combined with Registration can be a barrier to desexing

- Some Councils require microchipping before or at time of desexing which enables tracing for registration payment.
- People on low incomes are wary of having to pay an additional \$50 registration and so are unwilling to microchip their cat.
- Those wanting to desex multiple strays are unable to afford \$50 for each cat on top of the desexing and microchipping costs.

- semi-owners adopting a stray cat or two (desexing and microchipping cats in their name)
- Cat carers willing to manage a cat colony to desex and rehome or monitor until numbers reduce.

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Councils involved in NDN Cooperative Desexing Programs

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How much do these Councils budget for?

- \$1000 \$20 000 currently (as at Dec 2020)
- One large Qld Council has provided \$57 000 for one year
- Depends on size of population, community need, and capacity of Council
- The value in the NDN program - all Council funding is used for desexing subsidies — NOT for promotion or management costs, as other programs sometimes do

Benefits of Councils funding a well-structured ongoing Cooperative Desexing Program









1. REDUCTION IN NUMBERS OF UNWANTED KITTENS

Number of kittens coming into the City of Gold Coast pound and shelter

halved between 2005/6 and 2013/14










Gold Coast Kittens 2005/6 - 2019/20

Note: 2011/12 not included due to change in database management systems. Pound reclaims of kittens have not been made available since 2009/10. However numbers of reclaimed kittens had previously been very low.









2. LOWER CAT EUTHANASIA RATES

3. COUNCIL SAVINGS BY FUNDING DESEXING SUBSIDIES instead of COLLECT/HOLD/EUTHANIZE.

*These savings increase exponentially as for each prevented litter, thousands more kittens who would have been produced BY EACH CAT IN THE LITTER are also prevented.

Cat management strategies	Collect/Hold/ Euthanase one cat	Council NDN Desexing Subsidy (average) One cat	Savings by preventing one unwanted cat / or one litter	Savings in 1 year if 300 cats desexed (cost \$22 500), preventing one litter each
COSTS/SAVINGS held 4 days (on average)	\$220	\$75	\$145	\$43 500
COSTS held 14 days (on average)	\$420	\$75	\$345	\$103 500







COUNCIL SAVINGS BY FUNDING DESEXING SUBSIDIES instead of COLLECTING/HOLDING/REHOMING

Cat management strategies	COST Collect /Hold/ Rehome one cat	COST Council Desexing Subsidy (average) One cat	SAVINGS by preventing one unwanted cat, instead of rehoming	Savings by desexing 300 cats (cost \$22 500), instead of rehoming *
Costs/Savings if held 4 days on average	\$620	\$75	\$545	\$168 000
COSTS held 14 days (on average)	\$820	\$75	\$745	\$223 500







4. Positive animal management = greater satisfaction

5. Help people comply with desexing/breeder permit laws

- ACT, Tas, WA, SA, NSW legislated requirements to desex cats or pay for an annual permit to keep an undesexed cat.
- State Govt & Councils should support those in the community who have limited capacity to comply with this legislation









Is your cat desexed? Do you have a breeder permit?

Changes to Gold Coast City Council animal management legislation now require residents who intend to breed their cat or dog, to obtain a breeder permit from council.

To reduce numbers of unwanted and euthanased pets at local pounds, GCCC, with the national Desexing network (NDN) and the Animal Welfare League Qld, is running a subsidised desexing program.

The desexing program is an initiative of the Gold Coast City Council and Queensland State Government working with AWLLQ and NDN.

6. Reduces nuisance issues

- Fewer unwanted
 animals born means
 fewer stray wandering
 animals.
- This means fewer issues for non-pet owners as well as pet owners.









7. Cooperative Desexing Programs also Prevent Unowned Cats

SA Study 2014 -

- 46% of owned cats are not contained to their property at all times.
- Less then half of owned cats are desexed at 3-6 months
- Undesexed wandering cats can therefore breed & contribute to the unowned cat population









Both Environmental & Animal Management Depts benefit

Because both departments benefit a Cooperative Desexing Program could be cofunded by both departments.











8. The community can and will help if a more ethical approach is used

- Compassionate members of the community are keen to adopt or rehome stray and unsocialised cats, if they have access to low cost/free desexing
- Many of these frightened cats can become rewarding companions

9. Local face to face support

With NDN managing all the calls, voucher issue and vet payments, Animal Management Officers can:

- Visit residents in low socio-economic areas such as Permanent Caravan Parks, housing estates, older members of the community to offer vouchers and help get their cats to the vet e.g. provide carriers & transport
- Encourage semi-owners who are feeding stray cats to take ownership with free / low cost desexing, microchipping & registration
- Support people who are willing to desex and care for a colony of unowned cats in an urban area, til their numbers reduce







