Good Pet Behaviour

'Bad'

- not such as to be **hoped** for or desired; unpleasant or unwelcome
- of poor quality or a low standard
- not good in any manner or degree. having a wicked or evil character; morally reprehensible
- evil or morally unacceptable



Good Pet Behaviour

What is a problem?

- Behaviour causing difficulties for the care-giver or the pet
 - Unwelcome
 - Harmful
 - Needs to be dealt with
 - Needs to be overcome
 - o Or learn how to live with



Good Pet Behaviour

Is it the owner or the pet?

- · Good welfare for cared-givers and pets.
- Build and maintain the human animal bond.
- Behaviour:
 - Getting needs met
 - To adapt or cope with their environment.



Good Pet Behaviour

Getting needs met

- Secure (safe) social bonds
- Opportunity to express oneself and do things you enjoy
- Maintain adequate mental and physical health
 - 5 domains: nutrition, environment, health, behaviour, mental state,





Good Pet Behaviour

Adapt and cope with the environment

- Ability and opportunity to learn
- Reasonable control over what happens to them
- A reasonably predictable environment


Understanding is key to good relationships

Good Pet Behaviour

Personality

Emotionally unstable, extrovert, and low conscientious owner personalities are linked to behavioral concerns in dogs.





Good Pet Behaviour

Social and cultural environment

- Pet's inside the house/apartment
- Dog's barking
- Cat's spraying and fighting
- Child substitute
- Café lifestyle
- Cultural history and relationship with cats and dogs





Good Pet Behaviour

Medical factors

- Pain and discomfort increase irritability
- Pain increases noise sensitivity
 - Dogs with musculo-skeletal pain more noise sensitive
 - \circ Noise sensitivity decreased with treatment of pain

 Not understanding canine or feline body language



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Good Pet Behaviour

Education and Training

- Lack of appropriate education
- Type of training
 - Confrontation training techniques associated
 - with 25% dogs showing aggression
 - Increased fearfulness
 - Increase in separation anxiety





Good Pet Behaviour

Training style

- Owner seeking education around dogs training
- Dog is anxious

Good Pet Behaviour

Cats redirected aggression

- Reasonable for the cat to expect a safe home territory
- Genetic make up may influence nature of aggressive arousal
- Reasonable for owner to feel safe in their own home



A problem for the care-giver and the cat



Good Pet Behaviour

Aggression towards unfamiliar dogs.

Reasonable response on the part of the dog

Care giver offering social interaction and enrichment.

Good Pet Behaviour

Cat spraying

- Reasonable to let the newcomer know who lives here.
- Reasonable to not have cat spray in the house

Dog bites child

A reasonable response on the part of the dog

A reasonable expectation to keep the child safe



A problem for the care-giver and the dog



Alliance aggression

- Ivory needed the security of the care-giver
- Buster needed not to be attacked
- The care-givers needed to keep Buster safe and happy



• A problem for the care-giver, the companion dog and Ivory



Good Pet Behaviour

Cats defecates in the house

- A reasonable response for the cat
- Reasonable expectation of the care-giver

Good Pet Behaviour

Areas for improvement

- Better breeding practices
- Societal norms that take into account pet needs and welfare
- Better understanding of why animals behave as they do
- Ethical and effective training techniques
- Acknowledge role of genetics and environment
 - o not just the roles played by pets and their care-givers.
